Why We're All Here



“Teens and Technology” survey

- November 2004 survey of 1,100 young people between the ages of 12 and 17 and their parents:
 - More than half of them say they go online *every day*;
 - 81 percent of wired teens play games online, which is 52 percent higher than four years ago;
 - 76 percent of online teens get news online, which is 38 percent higher than four years ago;

“Teens and Technology” survey

- More:
 - 43 percent have made purchases online, which is 71 percent higher than four years ago;
 - 31 percent use the Internet to get health information, which is 47 percent higher than four years ago;
 - 80 percent of parents believe that the Internet helps teens do better in school;
 - 86 percent of students believe that the Internet helps teens do better in school.

\$100 laptops for the world's children

NON-PROFIT AIMS TO
DISSEMINATE BENEFITS
OF THE INTERNET

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — The \$100 laptop computers that Massachusetts Institute of Technology researchers want to get into the hands of the world's children will be durable, flexible and self-reliant.

The machines' AC adapter would double as a carrying strap, and a hand crank would power them when there's no electricity. They'd be foldable into more positions than traditional notebook PCs and carried like slim lunchboxes.

For outdoor reading, their display would be able to shift from full color to glare-resistant black and white.

And surrounding it all, the laptops would have a rubber casing that closes tightly, because "they have to be absolutely indestructible," said Nicholas Negroponte, the MIT Media Lab director. The computers would be

- One with the most potential for massive change.



Strategies

- Know and accept “the givens” – you *will* have to justify expenditures (handhelds), you *will* find yourself dealing with change (reorgs), you *will* have to prove technology’s worth (evaluation starts *beforehand*) – so just accept it, don’t fight it, and be proactive
- The “bullet mentality”

Strategies

- Know yourself – strengths, issues, challenges, biases
- Self Analysis Time
 - Write a strength
 - Write a challenge



Strategies

- Know your team members – higher-ups, staff, coworkers, attend their meetings, join them at their conferences
- Anyone bring them here?
- Reflection time again – choose a “not-so-close” coworker – Strengths? Challenges?
- Inviting coworkers – NOT JUST A FLYER ON THE BULLETIN BOARD 😊

Strategies

- Keep yourself informed – choose a good journal, use Netvibes or another blog aggregator, schedule a
- Information sources?
 - Non-techie friends
 - Journals – L&L, T&L
 - Others?
 - Blogs – specific ones in a minute 😊

Strategies

- Handle your own P.R. – share snippets of information with others, *tailored to their job*
- Dean
- Administrative Assistant
- Write now – draw a mind-map – who influences your boss? Leave no one out – her husband, secretary, the transportation director buddy? Repeat this process for your most challenging coworker?

Strategies

- Focus on what is working well – use your strengths
- Reflect – think about the thing you've done most recently for which you were very proud – let's talk about the details
- Now rinse and repeat

Strategies

- Schedule time for reflection – put it on your calendar – concrete time
- Example: Wednesday, 10:00-11:00, Door is closed, email is off.
- Or Wednesdays, get up 30 minutes earlier before the kids/significant other




